Secretary's Report – May 9th, 2009

Board Meeting

The board meeting convened at 9:30 with everyone present. The board discussed the following items not presented at the business meeting.

1. The board thanked Joan Dahl for all her years of hard work on behalf of NEDS and welcomed her replacement, Paul Tarmasewicz, to the board. Thanks for volunteering Paul.
2. Tower Hill Botanical Gardens notified the secretary that the 29th of August was booked by another group. THBG had changed computer systems, and one person had not changed. They also said that they had decided that our August sale would be treated as a private affair and that we would be billed \$300 for the room and non-NEDS people coming to the sale would have to pay an entrance fee. No publicity other than a notice on their website would be generated by THBG. The board discussed going elsewhere for the 29th with both of the other possibilities involving using a tent. It was decided to change the date to the 22nd at THBG for this year with other locations being an option in the future if this sale was not successful.

Program

Directions to Tower Hill Botanic Garden

From I-90 (Mass Pike) or I-495, take Route 290 to Exit 24, Church St. (Watch for Tower Hill directional signs.) Proceed 3 miles north towards Boylston. Entrance is on the right, just before blinking traffic light.

SCHEDULE

Upon entering Tower Hill, you must identify yourself at the Toll Station as a judge, clerk, worker, exhibitor, or NEDS member for free access to the Botanic Garden.

SET-UP

Friday, July 20th @ 2:00 p.m. Contact Dan Pessoni at 508-255-9348 or danthelilyman@aol.com. We will need about 5 to 8 volunteers.

Saturday, July 21st, Exhibition Day starts at 7:30 a.m. When dropping off your scapes to be exhibited, drive past the "do not enter" sign to the rear of the building. Drop off your scapes - someone will be there to help you. Return your car to the parking lot; there is no parking at the loading area.

Cleaning and grooming of scapes to be exhibited will be from 7:30 a.m. to no later than 10:45 a.m. All exhibited daylilies must be given to Dorothy Campbell, Classification Chair, for classification. Exhibit must be in completed form, i.e. in vase with tag completed and well groomed

Lisa Bourret, Placement Chair, and NEDS helpers will place your exhibit in the proper division. If your exhibit is one of the five Regional Popularity Poll lilies, it must be displayed in Division I, Section 9, Popularity Poll, not in large, small, miniature, etc. areas.

If you have any concerns about how to groom your daylilies for the Exhibition, someone will be there to educate and assist you. If you have questions, please contact Dan Pessoni.

This promises to be the most exciting NEDS sponsored Exhibition ever. Tower Hill Botanic Garden, the location for our Exhibition, is located on 132 acres with breathtaking views of Mt. Wachusett and Wachusett Reservoir. Take time to wander around this incredible garden.

DIVISION II - Horticulture Off-Scape

Division II is exhibited for display only and will not be judged.

Section 1: Registered Extra Large Flowers* 7" or more in diameter
 Groups A-Z (alphabetically by cultivar name.)

Section 2: Registered Large Flowers* 4 1/2" or more but under 7"
 Groups A-Z

Section 3: Registered Small Flowers* 3" or more but under 4 1/2"
 Groups A-Z

Section 4: Registered Miniature Flowers* less than 3"
 Groups A-Z

Section 5: Registered Double Flowers
 Groups A-Z

Section 6: Registered Spider Flowers - Spider ratio 4.0:1 or greater
 Groups A-Z

Section 7: Registered Unusual Form Flowers
 Groups A-Z

Section 8: Youth - Registered cultivars, any size, form, or pattern
 Groups A-Z

DIVISION III - Displays

- Class 1: Commercial; \$75 may be awarded
- Class 2: Non-Commercial; \$75 may be awarded

NOTE: In Division III Classes 1 and 2, any decorative foliage may be used, but no flowers other than daylilies should be included. Emphasis in these displays should be on a wide variety of colors and types of daylilies. Seedling daylilies should not dominate the display.

DIVISION IV - Education

Class A: Exhibits showing any phase of the growing, hybridizing, culture or classification of daylilies.

Class B: Exhibits showing the use of daylilies in art and/or literature.

Class C: A display of materials available through membership in the AHS.

Class D: Species - Not Judged
 Any species may be displayed, on scape

MAJOR AWARDS

The AHS Purple Award is awarded to each blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or more within Section 1 - 10 of Division I.

The AHS Rosette is awarded to the most outstanding purple ribbon winning entry in Sections 1 - 10 of Division I.

The AHS Best in Show Rosette is awarded to the best of the AHS Rosette winners in Section 1 – 10 of Division I.

The AHS Sweepstakes Rosette is awarded to the exhibitor winning the most blue ribbons in Division 1, Section 1 - 10. In the event of a tie, purple ribbons will be counted. If a tie should still exist, red, then yellow ribbons will be counted.

SPECIAL AWARDS

The AHS Achievement Medal is awarded to the originator of each collection of scapes in Division I, Section II, scoring an average of 90 points or more, and which in the opinion of the judges, shows adequate and distinctiveness as compared with existing cultivars. The cultivar must be a seedling or pre-registered (a pre-registered cultivar is considered a seedling.) Lilies must be entered by number as assigned by the Classification Committee. Each of the judges on the panel assigned to judge the entries will point score each scape individually. The score sheets will be returned to the General Show Chair who will tabulate the scores and announce the winner(s).

The AHS Award of Appreciation, a rosette, may be given at the discretion of the local show committee, not the judges, to one or more non-competitive educational exhibits in Division IV to show appreciation for the significant efforts involved.

LOCAL AWARDS

Class 1: New England Daylily Award

This award is given to the exhibitor of the finest specimen on scape of a registered daylily originated in New England. The entry does not have to be made by the hybridizer. Any number of entries may be made by the same exhibitor as long as each entry shown is a different cultivar.

Class 2: Collection - Judged by Scale of Points.

- Six registered varieties in six vases, on scapes
- \$15.00, \$10.00, \$5.00, Division I, Section 12

Class 3: Collection - Judged by Scale of Points

Six numbered seedlings in six vases on scapes not necessarily the exhibitor's own.
 \$15.00, \$10.00, \$5.00, Division I, Section 12

Class 4: Sweepstakes Winner (Youth Classes)

First Prize: \$15.00

Class 5: A.H.S. Sweepstakes Winners

Awarded to the exhibitor winning the most blue ribbons in Division 1, Sections 1 - 10.

First Prize: \$25.00; Runner-Up: \$15.00

Class 6: Best-in-Show

Winner will receive a \$25 Award.

NOTE: Registered cultivars which are polytepals but are not registered as such, may be exhibited in LOCAL sections. However, they must be judged according to their registration - size, color, form, etc.

As you can see, **Condition and Grooming is very important. You can lose up to 15 points if your exhibit is not groomed properly, i.e. brown on the scape, pollen on the petals, etc.**

It's August Auction & Bargain Table Sale Time!

Hope you are all having a wonderful growing season. While out strolling through your daylilies, think of which clumps will need dividing and what of your favorites you could donate to the August auction and bargain sales tables. We are going to need your help and daylilies more than ever this year. With NEDS being at Tower Hill and the increase of potential customers, it means that we could be positively over run with folks wanting daylilies. Let's not disappoint them.

This year's sale will begin at 11:00am and run either until the tables are sold out or noon – whichever comes first. We need LOTS of plants for the "bargain" sales tables, where each bag will sell for \$5.00. Remember they should be 3 or more fans of named varieties, bagged and labeled with their name and a brief description including color and height. Hybridizer, year, ploidy, and growth habit also are helpful. Photos are great, but not required. The plant value should be at least \$10.00 (less than \$15.00) per bag to give our buyers a good bargain. We want everyone to go away from the bargain tables feeling like they won the lottery! If they have a good time and get good plants, they will come back year after year and continue to help support our club. Any leftover plants will be made into "grab bags" which will be auctioned off at the end of the scheduled auction. This is a wonderful opportunity for those folks looking for bulk plants at a very reasonable cost. Following the bargain table sales, with a short intermission to set up chairs, the auction will begin.

Please bring some of your nicer plants that you can share with us, it is a great way to help support the club and give other members and the public and opportunity to upgrade their daylily varieties with ones that are a bit more cutting edge. Donations for **Auction** should have the above listed information, PLUS the average Eureka double fan price to help us save time during the auction. The more expensive plants can be double fans or strong singles.

Donations need to be brought in to the sales tables and auction area before 10:30 so that we have time to get everything set up before the doors open for the sale.

We will begin accepting plants at 9:00. The plants for the bargain tables will be arranged by primarily by color, although we do have a section for doubles and unusual forms. The auction selections go to a different section so as to not be confused with sales table plants. See myself or Leila if help is needed once you get to the event room with your plants.

This year for the August Auction we have a collection of plants (2006 intros) from the very popular hybridizer Curt Hanson of Ohio.
