October 25 Guest Speakers:

Mike Huben

Gardener, botanist, hybridizer, and all-around plant fanatic. I've named my site "Diploids Resurgent" because I'd like to encourage others to appreciate the diploids too, rather than simply follow the tetraploid fashions. There's a world of daylilies out there besides southern-bred eyed and edged tets, and the most diverse are the diploids. Oh, I've got southern-bred tets in my garden: some are fantastic, and I wouldn't put them down. But here in the north (Arlington, MA) we have different needs that the southerners can't or don't breed for.

Rick Goodenough

Rick lives with his wife, Sheila in Marshfield, Massachusetts. He is a member of the NEHS and long time member of the AHS. Rick became interested in hostas when living in Indianapolis in the early nineties upon visiting the hosta garden/nursery of Marge Soules. He was first amazed at the variety of hosta plants and quickly became interested in the more unusual variegation patterns on plants like 'High Fat Cream', 'Cynthia', 'Joseph', 'Spilt Milk' and 'Iron Gate Supreme'. He collected several beginner hostas before career relocation to the Boston area in 1996. The home he and Sheila acquired in Marshfield had no garden and the back was a steeply sloped and forested hillside. Rick began work on it and has continued to this day in building stone terraces and using cobbles from old Boston streets for paths in the garden. Larger trees were left in place to provide high shade that our favorite shade plant so

appreciates.

After learning that hostas with color variations were essentially only produced by streaked pod parents, Rick knew that hybridizing was something he wanted to try. 'Fascination' was one of his first streakers and he quickly added 'Galaxy', 'Alan Haskell', 'Dorothy Benedict' and 'Outrageous' to his growing stable of breeders.

Rick began hybridizing and has named and introduced over 200 cultivars of his own seedlings and continues to enjoy advancing the species through his hybridizing efforts. He has served in a number of roles in the NEHS, has served the AHS on the Executive Committee and has written numerous articles for the AHS Hosta Journal and other publications and gives presentations and lectures on hostas and other gardening related topics.

Roger Smith

Roger Smith, a retired U.S. Air Force member with twenty-five years of service and now a Department of Defense employee, has always had a garden in his life. From planting oak and pine trees as a kid to growing peppers on the window ledge during an unaccompanied tour in Korea, there's always been time for a garden. When he and his young family moved to Severn, Maryland in mid 80's, a lot of shade came in the form of a giant sycamore and red maples in the yard, thus the hosta bug was started. After about 10 years of believing he had all three hosta types (the green, green-white, and the blue one), he found a local nursery that carried about 50 cultivars to include H. 'Liberty' – that started his desire to find and grow more types. After moving to a larger house with many mature oaks, he decided he now had the room to grow hostas from seeds to "make his own" types. Those growing efforts start with

more than 6,000 seeds each fall that are grown in a sun room under lights. These seedlings are then culled down to about 10% by the following spring which are then grown on for two years to see what they'll do. So far, Roger has registered two hostas of his own. The extras are often donated as auction donations and gift plants to support the First Look event. He, along with some close friends across the states, is currently working on advancing red into the hosta leaf surface.

Additionally, he and a couple other AHS members arranged to move the Arthur Wrede hosta collection of unnamed seedlings to his central Maryland yard. Roger is a member of the Potomac Hosta Club, the American Hosta Society and is the AHS Education Outreach Chair.
