Barry Matthie at NEDS

All week, an internal battle raged. Should I go to NEDS???? Should I stay home and complete my late fall garden chores ???? I must have gone back and forth one hundred times... but then I got a hold of myself... and said "GO TO NEDS ON SATURDAY!!" I did, and boy was I glad I did.

It was a crisp late fall day.... and the trees had shed most of their leaves. But the road up to the top of Tower Hill in Boylston was still a marvel of nature. I never tire of seeing the varying seasonal changes in the landscape. The view from the top of the hill, of the nearby lake and surrounding Massachusetts countryside... always refreshes the weary soul. Upon entering the building, the open conservatory doors beckoned with the glint of greenery and fragrance of hothouse blooms.

In our meeting room, some members had

already arrived. It was our annual pot luck dinner and hybridizer presentation, a popular meeting with the members. Preparations continued and the room hummed with the gathering crowd.

After a brief meeting and some discussion groups, we were ready to get down to business and EAT. There is always a bounty of provisions brought by club members and everyone found many things to enjoy. After our group enjoyed their meals, we settled in for a wonderful presentation by Barry Matthie of Bloomfield, Ontario, Canada. His wife Maggie and her sister Shirley had accompanied him on this trip. Program chair, George Viamari, and his wife, Kathy, were keeping them duly entertained. I was delighted to find a seat right next to Barry and we exchanged some fun daylily experiences.

As he rolled out his program, we soon found that Barry has his work cut out for him as a hybridizer and daylily grower. The soil condition of his Bloomfield farm was surprising. Only about 6 inches of loam covers rock. Barry said his original bloom season lasted only about 2 weeks due to this factor. Now with the use of wood/bark chips dumped by a generous landscaping neighbor, he has extended his bloom period to 5-6 weeks. This inch deep layer of bark mulch helps conserve moisture which is at a premium. Additionally, Prince Edward County also experiences extensive drought periods. As an aside, Barry said that the island on which Bloomfield is located has become a new hot spot for a myriad of new vineyards as the dry conditions provide the perfect growing conditions for grapes. The crowd responded in surprise over his daylily plant numbers. He estimated that he grows over 100,000 daylilies, including seedlings. This is in addition to other perennials such as hostas and oriental lilies which he grows and sells as well.

Hybridizing takes place in his large greenhouse during the summer. This is dismantled every winter, so that the fierce winds and snow do not damage it. His wife turned to me during our visit and said that Barry farms as well. It is amazing to see the amount of work he has undertaken.

After a brief slide tour of his operation, we were delighted with images of fantastic daylilies of all kinds. We viewed many of his past and newer introductions... with the oohs and aahs arising from the crowd as he went thru the slides. Barry dabbles in tets and dips. and says he does not focus on any one type of daylily. He has had some interesting breaks come his way. Hemerocalis 'Bonibrae THE FREAK' is a diploid UF and a kid of Substantial Evidence. It never displays the same form twice, but is changeable, exhibiting spatulate, recurved, twisted and pinched petals. Barry says "The Freak' has been passing these traits to its kids.

H. 'Bonibrae Witches and Warlocks' is a dark purple toothy specimen that has bigger teeth on the sepals than on the petals! Deep sculpting and extravagant edges adorned 'Bonibrae Heart Breaker'. 'Bonibrae Smoke and Mirrors', a diploid, is very unique.... Adele piped up to say there is nothing else like it in her garden!

Many of Barry's daylilies are dormants.. His zone is between 5a and 4b.

We were very excited to be able to bid on his generous donations of daylilies. The lucky winners will certainly be excited to receive them next spring. I am sure the club was grateful for his beautiful and informative presentation AND for the donations of daylilies to add to our gardens. Thank you Barry, and we hope you had a safe trip home!
